



Improving Mental Health of Diverse Groups

Can you imagine the stress and strain resulting from a move to a new country? Imagine trying to learn a new language, adapting to a new culture and then trying to navigate a treatment system for mental health and addictions. With so many looming challenges it is difficult for newcomers to Canada to have equal access to health services. Health equity has been described as ensuring equal opportunities for health for all and this goal becomes a challenge for health service providers as Canada becomes more diverse each year.

According to the 2006 census there are 31 million people living in Canada and over 5 million of this population were born outside of Canada. Health equity issues will be discussed from a National and local perspective at the next CAMH in the Community event.

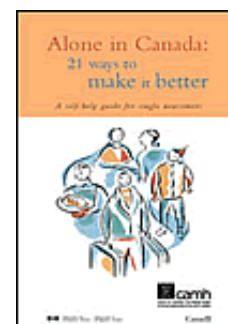

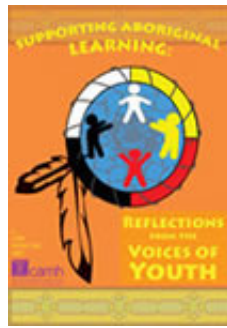
