BUILD ... a groundbreaking to make CAMH Queen Street Toronto's most life changing address

Think of it as breaking new ground on very old territory. It's also history in the making.

On April 6, 2010, CAMH embarks on the second phase of its landmark redevelopment project. The goal is to transform our outmoded Queen Street site into an 'urban village,' where being part of the community is part of

the treatment. It's a project that advances a progressive, modern approach to working with those with mental illness and addiction, community integration and city-building. And it's all happening on ground that has housed a psychiatric facility since 1850.

... and a Research Renaissance takes root on College Street

The shovels also went in the ground on March 23 at CAMH's College Street Site, ushering in a project which will advance our understanding of mental illness and addictions ranging from the neuron to the neighbourhood level. Millions of lives will be affected by our continuously progressive research.

That's the scope and ambition of Discovery Lives Here: CAMH Research Renaissance Project, funded as a component of a \$38 million grant from the Canada Foundation for Innovation's Research Hospital Fund, and the CAMH Foundation – with the goal of building on our unique interdisciplinary approach to basic, clinical, social, and epidemiological research to the next level.

Groundbreaking on Queen Street West

CAMH's new facilities are designed on a residential scale to facilitate the recovery model of treatment, to support independence and to allow for self-directed care and empowerment. They're all about inclusiveness and community integration – featuring natural light, outdoor views, courtyards and social spaces.

In the new **CAMH Gateway Building**, the client-run Out of this World Café and its sidewalk patio (*right*) will add to the street life and create a neighbourhood atmosphere, as will a new gymnasium and green spaces to be shared with the community.

One new building, the 60-bed **Intergeneration Wellness Centre (IWC)** – *pictured on the cover* will place services for children and youth alongside those of CAMH's Geriatric Mental Health Program to foster the greatest possible degree of integration and collaboration to benefit our clients.

The IWC will feature Canada's first dedicated beds for youth aged 14-18 who are contending with both mental health and addictions issues (concurrent disorders), along with day-treatment programs to help at-risk youth before they require a hospital bed.

CAMH's Child, Youth and Family program will configure inpatient and outpatient services to give clients hope in their recovery, celebrate progress and help with transitioning.

Green is the colour. A new **Parking and Utilities Building** considerably reduces CAMH's environmental footprint by centralizing natural-gas heating and cooling for all of CAMH's new facilities and eliminating most surface parking. In fact it's one of several ways this redevelopment is 'green' (*see below*).

CAMH is building the first hospital in Ontario to meet LEED Gold environmental certification

- **New buildings** will save nearly 33% of energy costs
- **Reduced greenhouse gas emissions** equivalent to 220 fewer cars on the road
- **White roofs** and a partial green roof
- **Underground bicycle racks** and showers to encourage cycling
- **Public transportation** will come into the site
- **Sustainable design** – building design is flexible rather than purpose-built, to ensure adaptability to future needs
- **Pedestrian-friendly streetscapes** and attention to landscaping and green spaces

Neighbours and visitors to Queen Street West will notice obvious changes – extending local streets like Ossington Ave onto CAMH’s 27-acre Queen Street site. They’ll also see pedestrian-friendly streetscapes and of course, new buildings – three new CAMH facilities and a new non-CAMH use building, right on Queen Street West (to be developed by Forum Verdiroc), with ground-level retail and much-needed affordable rental housing.



In many ways, it’s the less-obvious facets of this project that are the most transformative. CAMH is replacing its institutional campus with a community setting for care – one that allows for a truly client-centred, recovery-based model of treatment, as well as integration with the community to help break down stigma.

CAMH awarded two major national research grants

CAMH teams were awarded two of six major Emerging Team Grants in a strategic program targeting “Co-morbidity of brain disorders and other health problems.”

The Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) earmarked nearly \$2.6 million in groundbreaking mental health research at CAMH over the next five years. One grant allows staff led by CAMH’s Child, Youth & Family Program to do multifaceted work in child and youth concurrent disorders (co-occurring mental illness and addictions problems).

The other grant will allow scientists in our Social, Prevention and Health Policy Research unit to carry out community-based research using the new Mobile Lab that’s part of the Research Renaissance project.

Research Renaissance Team



Renovations to CAMH’s College Street Site will include new laboratories as well as enhanced neuroimaging capacity, adding a second cyclotron and our first MRI machine to CAMH’s Positron Emission Tomography (PET) Centre (the cyclotron part of the project is partially funded by the Ontario Ministry of Research and Innovation). Innovations range from a Work and Well-Being Lab for workplace mental health issues to a Mobile Community Lab that will literally bring science to local and underserved communities.

This tour-de-force project unfolds along six themes: Schizophrenia, Mood Disorders, Addictions, Community Health & Knowledge Exchange, Neuroimaging, and Pharmacogenetics & Neuroscience. It will address:

- Optimizing treatment across mental illness and substance use disorders, including the development of personalized medicine based on molecular genetics
- Translating discoveries into improved clinical practice, prevention and intervention strategies
- Reaching out to underserved and understudied communities such as First Nations, remote populations, the workplace, women, the elderly, and children
- Maximizing the impact of all six funded themes through effective knowledge transfer and exchange
- Reducing the health care costs and social burdens of mental health and addictions problems, while creating commercialization opportunities and specialized employment

Schizophrenia Program advances a new approach to care

CAMH may be redeveloping its sites to embrace recovery and social inclusion, but transformation's also the watchword for our largest clinical service. The Schizophrenia Program is in the midst of a renaissance of its own – working to increase access to care, develop new services that treat people at home and creating alternatives to hospitalization.

It also means working more and more with community partners in housing and other areas to offer supported care – in the community. And CAMH providing Mobile Crisis Teams and more community-based care. A great example of this approach is CAMH's Home Intervention for Psychosis (HIP) Team —serving young people experiencing their first episode of psychosis and their families.

HIP brings together an interprofessional care team of nurses, a social worker and a psychiatrist who are passionate about delivering in-home specialized treatment, rehabilitation and education for young people and their families.

Located at CAMH, the PGIO will better integrate our leading work in clinical work, research, knowledge exchange and policy.

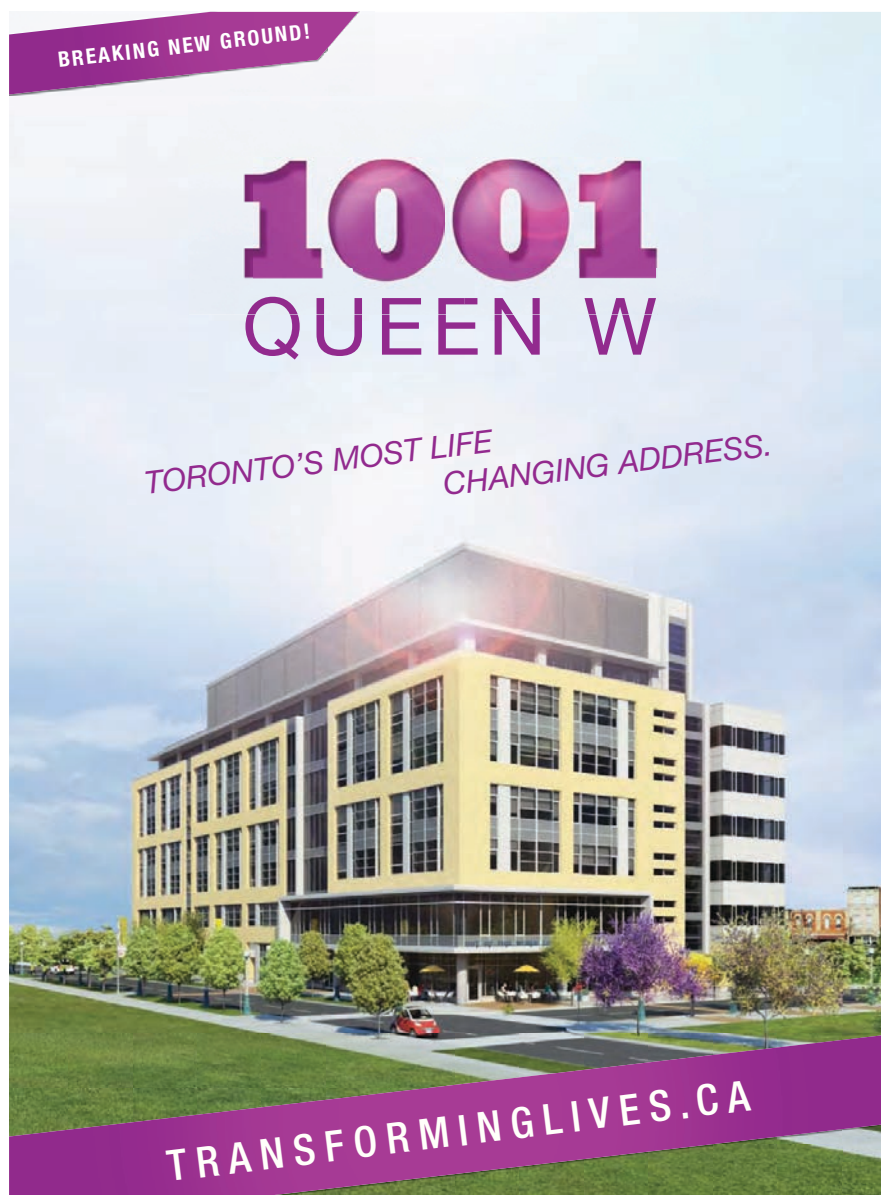
